The Koongarra area was added to the Kakadu World Heritage Area by the World Heritage Committee on 27 June 2011, in recognition of its outstanding natural and cultural values.

The 1,228 hectare Koongarra area was excluded from Kakadu National Park's original boundaries in 1979 because of its potential uranium resources, although no mineral exploration or mining rights were ever granted. Koongarra has strong cultural importance to the traditional owners, who do not want to see Koongarra mined and wanted the area added to the National Park and the World Heritage Area.

The inclusion of Koongarra into the Kakadu World Heritage area means that it will have protection under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity and Conservation Act, 1999*.
