On 21 July 1991 near the reef off Jurien Bay Mr Anderson boarded an abandoned oil tanker under conditions of extreme danger, and once on board took the necessary action to enable the stricken vessel to be towed to safety, thereby averting a major pollution disaster. Mr Anderson was an Engine Room Rating on the oil rig tender "LADY KATHLEEN" which responded to a distress call from the tanker which had lost its fore-section in heavy seas, and was spilling oil. severe wind and wave conditions, and aware of the risk of conflagration, Mr Anderson volunteered to board the tanker with two companions. Despite both vessels pitching and rolling at different rates and the almost certainty of being crushed or drowned if he missed, Mr Anderson leaped across a two metre gap between the vessels and brought a line aboard the tanker. Working under hazardous and difficult conditions he participated in rigging and connecting a tow line, and remained on board rendering the stricken tanker safe for three

By his actions Mr Anderson displayed conspicuous courage.

Mr Kevin Michael HURLEY Lot 10 Christmas Tree Court NORTH BOYANUP WA 6237

On 21 July 1991 near the reef off Jurien Bay Mr Hurley boarded an abandoned oil tanker under conditions of extreme danger and once on board took the necessary action to enable the stricken vessel to be towed to safety, thereby averting a major pollution disaster. Mr Hurley was an Able Seaman on the oil rig tender "LADY KATHLEEN" when she responded to a distress call from the tanker which had lost its fore-section in heavy seas, and was spilling oil. severe wind and wave conditions, and aware of the risk of conflagration, Mr Hurley volunteered to board the tanker with two companions to transfer tow wires from "LADY KATHLEEN". Despite both vessels pitching and rolling at different rates and the almost certainty of being crushed or drowned if he missed, Mr Hurley leaped across a two metre gap between the On board the stricken tanker, working under hazardous and difficult conditions, Mr Hurley and his companions rigged and connected a tow line, and remained on board maintaining a tow watch for three days.

Miss Rachelle McNIVEN 39 Lagoon Street NARRABEEN NSW 2101

On the afternoon of 21 March 1992 Miss McNiven rescued a boy from drowning in heavy and dangerous seas off North Narrabeen Beach. Miss McNiven was standing near Narrabeen Baths when she saw a boy being swept by a strong rip through heavy and turbulent seas towards violent, dumping Aware of the dangers of the situation, and with doubts of her own capacity to handle the conditions, Miss McNiven dived from nearby rocks and swam to the boy. During the ensuing 40 minutes Miss McNiven supported, encouraged and comforted the boy as she swam him over, under and across huge waves and violent breakers. Although Miss McNiven and her charge were carried more than 300 metres off shore and subjected to considerable physical and psychological pressure, she maintained a courageous determination that sustained them both until help arrived.

By her actions Miss McNiven displayed conspicuous courage.

Mr Gregory Charles MEAGHER 579 Rockingham Road SPEARWOOD WA 6163

On 21 July 1991 near the reef off Jurien Bay Mr Meagher boarded an abandoned oil tanker under conditions of extreme danger and once on board took the necessary action to enable the stricken vessel to be towed to safety, thereby averting a major pollution disaster. Mr Meagher was an Able Seaman on the oil rig tender "LADY KATHLEEN" when she responded to a distress call from the tanker which had lost its fore-section in heavy seas, and was spilling oil. severe wind and wave conditions, and aware of the risk of conflagration, Mr Meagher volunteered to board the tanker with two companions to transfer tow wires from "LADY KATHLEEN". Despite both vessels pitching and rolling at different rates and the almost certainty of being crushed or drowned if he missed, Mr Meagher leaped across a two metre gap between the tender and the ship. On board the stricken tanker, working under hazardous and difficult conditions, Mr Meagher with his companions rigged and connected a tow line, and remained on board rendering the vessel safe and maintaining a tow watch for the ensuing three days.

By his actions Mr Meagher displayed conspicuous courage.

STAR OF COURAGE

Mr Gregory Christopher READ 813/55 Walker Street REDFERN NSW 2016

On the afternoon of 17 August 1991 Mr Read placed his own life in jeopardy and continued in a life-threatening situation to protect others during a shooting massacre at Strathfield Plaza shopping complex. Mr Read was shopping when he heard several extended bursts of fire and saw a man with a rifle moving through the complex and firing indiscriminately. Fully aware of the risk and without regard for his own safety, Mr Read ran upwards through the Plaza ahead of the gunman warning people to take cover. Despite shots passing closely around him Mr Read continued moving through an exposed position to alert people until, at an upper level car park, the gunman wounded him with two successive shots. At the time he was wounded Mr Read was in an open space advising a motorist to take cover.

By his actions Mr Read displayed conspicuous courage.

Detective Superintendent John Thomas TURNER New South Wales Police Service

On the afternoon of 21 February 1992 Detective Superintendent Turner apprehended and participated in disarming an offender at Seven Hills Shopping Mall. Superintendent Turner was off duty and shopping at the Mall when an armed man carrying a cash tin ran towards him. Superintendent Turner, aware of the dangers involved, stood in the path of the offender, stated his office and tensed himself to tackle him. A violent struggle followed, during which Superintendent Turner was struck by the gun which discharged. Eventually Superintendent Turner was able to grab the man's ankle and bring him to the ground. He fell on the offender and attempted to gain possession of the gun which then discharged again. With the aid of bystanders the man was disarmed and detained by Superintendent Turner until the arrival of other police officers.

By his actions Detective Superintendent Turner displayed conspicuous courage.

Mr Arthur William ALDRIDGE 77 Endeavour Street SEVEN HILLS NSW 2147

On the afternoon of 21 February 1992 Mr Aldridge participated in disarming an offender at Seven Hills Shopping Mall. Mr Aldridge was in the Mall when he heard a gun discharge and people screaming. Mr Aldridge then saw two men engaged in a violent struggle, one of them armed. Aware of the dangers involved Mr Aldridge ran towards the man and grabbed the arm that was holding the gun which then discharged again. In order to prevent more shots being fired into the busy Mall Mr Aldridge placed his right index finger between the hammer and the firing pin and held the hammer with his right thumb. Although the struggle continued Mr Aldridge maintained his grip on the gun, ensuring that no bystanders were injured, until the offender released it.

By his actions Mr Aldridge displayed considerable bravery.

Mr 'Isileli Takau 'ALONE 89 Best Road SEVEN HILLS NSW 2147

On the afternoon of 21 February 1992 Mr 'Alone participated in disarming an offender at Seven Hills Shopping Mall. Mr 'Alone was in the Mall when he heard a man shouting to shoppers to stop another man who was running away. Mr 'Alone joined in the pursuit and continued, aware of the danger involved, after he had observed that the man was armed. An older man stepped in front of the offender and a violent conflict ensued. As Mr 'Alone approached the gun discharged, the two struggling men fell to the ground and another shot was fired. Regardless of his own personal safety, Mr 'Alone grabbed the armed man by the right arm and with the assistance of other bystanders took the gun from the man who was detained until the arrival of police.

By his actions Mr 'Alone displayed considerable bravery.

Ms Angela Leigh BURKE SUNNYBANK QLD 4109

On the afternoon of 13 November 1991 at Sunnybank Ms Angela Burke, then aged 16, saved a boy under attack from a street gang of youths. Angela was with a male friend when she saw the boy, a stranger to her, being struck and gouged with a beer bottle. Disregarding the danger to herself Angela moved without hesitation to the aid of the boy. While her friend engaged the assailants, Angela drew the injured boy clear and applied first aid to his serious wounds. Despite the imminent danger of her situation, Angela continued to give assistance, comfort and protection to her patient until the arrival of Ambulance Service officers.

By her action Ms Burke displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Douglas Gordan CAINE Late of 42 Keymer Road BELMONT WA 6104

Early in the morning of 16 February 1992 Mr Caine gave his life in the attempted rescue of a youth from a disused 16 metre well at Walliston. Mr Caine was a guest at a home when told that the youth had fallen to the bottom of the well in the back yard. Without hesitation Mr Caine climbed down a plastic hose pipe which he knew was of insufficient length to afford a means of return and supported the youth clear of the water in the bottom of the well. During the rescue attempt both Mr Caine and the youth were overcome by gas fumes, and lost their lives.

By his actions Mr Caine displayed considerable bravery thereby losing his life.

On the afternoon of 17 August 1991 Mrs Dickinson gave her life in a rescue from a shooting massacre at Strathfield Plaza shopping complex. Mrs Dickinson was with her daughter and a friend in a coffee lounge at the Plaza when a male customer began shooting at people indiscriminately. While their friend advanced towards the gunman Mrs Dickinson, without regard for her own safety, immediately leaped onto a nearby table reducing the scope of the gunman's arc of fire. With her daughter shielded by her own body Mrs Dickinson pushed her to safety, suffering a fatal wound from the gunman's rifle as she did so.

By her actions Mrs Dickinson displayed considerable bravery thereby losing her life.

Mr Charles ELWELL 124 Hampdon Road ESK QLD 4312

Late in the afternoon of 9 March 1992 Mr Charles Elwell pursued an armed man in a high speed car chase from Esk towards Brisbane. Mr Elwell was alerted of trouble when he saw two men fighting in a parked car at Esk. As he approached the vehicle Mr Elwell heard a gunshot and saw the car move off in an irregular manner. Mr Elwell immediately ran to his utility and gave chase. During the subsequent pursuit Mr Elwell came under fire from the fleeing gunman but continued the chase despite the risk to his own safety. Undeterred by the further dangers of speeds up to 140 kilometres per hour and uncertain traffic conditions, Mr Elwell maintained the pursuit until he forced his quarry to abandon both car and firearm and take to the fields on foot from where he was subsequently taken into custody.

By his actions Mr Elwell displayed considerable bravery.

Miss Priscilla Anne HENSLER Lot 42 Donolly Road MORUYA NSW 2537

On the morning of 21 September 1992 off Moruya Heads Miss Hensler paddled her surfboard over a kilometre through dangerous seas to rescue a fisherman from drowning. Miss Hensler was surfing at North Moruya when she was informed that a fisherman had been swept from nearby rocks and carried out to sea by the ebbing tide. After arranging for emergency services to be alerted Miss Hensler entered the heavy seas south of the breakwater and commenced searching for the Although well aware of the danger of her own fisherman. situation, Miss Hensler persisted in her self-imposed task until she reached the now seriously weakened fisherman 800 metres from the shore. In conditions of rising swells and deteriorating visibility, with the shore line out of sight, Miss Hensler supported the fisherman and brought him into calmer waters where she was able to transfer him to a Moruya Surf Club rescue vessel.

By her actions Miss Hensler displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Simon David HOLMES 23 Woff Street SUNNYBANK QLD 4109

On the afternoon of 13 November 1991 at Sunnybank Mr Holmes rescued a boy under attack from a street gang of youths. Mr Holmes was with a friend when he saw the boy, a stranger, being struck and gouged with a beer bottle. Without regard for his own safety Mr Holmes immediately engaged two of the assailants, drawing them away from their victim and allowing his friend to withdraw the wounded boy to a safer position where she could apply first aid. Despite injuries from his opponents Mr Holmes maintained the engagement, drawing the affray further from the wounded boy until the arrival of more people caused the attackers to leave the area.

By his actions Mr Holmes displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Gregory Patrick HOWARD Huon Hotel CYGNET TAS 7112

In the early hours of 17 February 1992 Mr Howard rescued a man from the upper storey of a burning hotel at Cygnet. When Mr Howard, the owner of the hotel, was told of the fire he ran from his house next door to rescue the sole occupant. Mr Howard climbed onto the roof of a single storey structure then to a balcony to gain access through a window but was forced by the heat and smoke to withdraw immediately. Following the sound of groans he went to another window which he smashed with his arm but was again unable to enter. Mr Howard then pulled the entire window frame out allowing him to reach in through the clearing smoke and touch the head of the unconscious man. He was now able to climb in and lift the man half over the ledge, climb out and carry him across the roof of the lower level where he was assisted by others.

By his actions Mr Howard displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Thomas Leatham HUNT PENOLA SA 5277

On the afternoon of 9 November 1991 Mr Hunt participated in the rescue of a man from a burning vehicle which had overturned on the Moulamein Road at Mallan. Mr Hunt stopped at the scene of the accident and went to the assistance of a woman who had attempted unsuccessfully to remove the driver of the burning crashed vehicle. His first attempt to pull the driver clear failed as he was driven back by the intense heat. Although aware of the dangers involved Mr Hunt tried again and with the assistance of the woman succeeded in removing the driver from the vehicle. At this time the driver's trousers, which had been covered by leaking petrol, were burning. Mr Hunt persevered until he had extinguished the driver's clothing.

By his actions Mr Hunt displayed considerable bravery.

Mrs Janelle Anne MATTISKE "Bareenong" via FORBES NSW 2871

On the morning of 20 January 1992 Mrs Mattiske rescued four occupants from the blazing wreckage of a crashed car on the Newell Highway near Forbes. Mrs Mattiske had heard the sounds of a vehicle leaving the road and drove to the accident site to offer assistance. On arrival she found the smashed car inverted and burning from a ruptured fuel line with the occupants trapped inside. Without regard for her personal safety Mrs Mattiske forced open a door, removed two adults from the front of the car and assisted them to safety. Although the fire had intensified Mrs Mattiske returned and reaching into the car removed a child. With the car now burning fiercely and likely to explode Mrs Mattiske again returned and went to the rear of the car to rescue a baby. Immediately after, the car was engulfed in flames.

By her actions Mrs Mattiske displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Wesley William MULDOWNEY Late of Graffunder Street MACKAY OLD 4740

Early in the morning of 16 December 1989,
Mr Muldowney gave his life in rescuing a stranger under attack

youths assaulting an elderly man. Although aware of the
danger of his actions Mr Muldowney led his two companions into
the affray, accepting the obvious risk of severe personal
injury in order to save the victim from further harm.
Mr Muldowney's bravery was rewarded by the escape of the
elderly man. During the encounter Mr Muldowney was struck
from behind, and died while still engaged with his
adversaries.

By his actions Mr Muldowney displayed considerable bravery thereby losing his life.

Mr Robert Ian PETTIGREW Late of 4 Domonic Close HARRINGTON NSW 2427

On the afternoon of 29 February 1992 Mr Pettigrew lost his life in rescuing a boy and a man from drowning at Crowdy Head. Mr Pettigrew was surfing with his wife at Crowdy Head when he heard a call for help from a boy caught in a powerful rip. Although well aware of the risks involved, Mr Pettigrew immediately went to his aid and after some difficulty removed the boy from danger. At this stage another man, further out, indicated that he was in trouble in the rip. Without regard for his personal safety Mr Pettigrew swam out across the dangerous rip to give assistance. During the rescue attempt Mr Pettigrew drowned.

By his actions Mr Pettigrew displayed considerable bravery thereby losing his life.

Mr Johan Marines PRONK 13/119 Corrimal Street WOLLONGONG NSW 2500

On the afternoon of 24 January 1992 Mr Pronk apprehended an armed robber in Wollongong Mall. Mr Pronk, a customer in a nearby store, was told that an armed robbery was taking place at a building society and went out into the Mall. He saw a man carrying a bag running from the location of the robbery and confirmed that this was the offender. Aware of the dangers involved Mr Pronk pursued the robber, crash tackled him to the ground and restrained him until help arrived.

By his actions Mr Pronk displayed considerable bravery.

Mrs Joy Rosalie ROBINSON 1 Tualka Terrace MOULAMEIN NSW 2733

On the afternoon of 9 November 1991 Mrs Robinson participated in the rescue of a man from a burning vehicle which had overturned on the Moulamein Road at Mallan. Mrs Robinson arrived on the scene shortly after the accident had occurred and found the driver still restrained by his seat belt with the rear of the vehicle starting to burn. some difficulty the seat belt was released and Mrs Robinson, although aware of the dangers involved, tried to drag the driver free but lacked the strength to do so. Within moments the entire vehicle was alight and, as the driver tried to slowly move to safety, Mrs Robinson ran to the road and enlisted the aid of a passing motorist. On their second attempt Mrs Robinson and the motorist were able to drag the driver free with his trousers, which had been covered by leaking petrol, burning.

By her actions Mrs Robinson displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Dave Jan Roelof SUIKER 9 Plume Court LESMURDIE WA 6076

Early in the morning of 16 February 1992 Mr Suiker placed his own safety at risk in the attempted rescue of a man and a youth from a disused 16 metre well at Walliston. Mr Suiker was present when an older man, going to the aid of a youth who had fallen to the bottom of the well, was overcome by gas fumes. Mr Suiker climbed down a plastic hose pipe which he knew was of insufficient length to afford a means of return and endeavoured to support the youth and the older man clear of the water until he too succumbed to the gas fumes. Mr Suiker was brought to the surface by Fire Brigade Officers but his two companions lost their lives.

By his actions Mr Suiker displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Alan David Lloyd WILLIAMS 25 Garner Road KIRWAN OLD 4817

On 2 May 1990 Mr Williams, then a member of the Queensland Police Service, subdued an armed man at Palm The armed man had threatened to kill himself and other people and had taken up a position with a clear field of fire when (then) Constable First Class Williams and other Police and their vehicle came under officers arrived. intermittent fire and random shots were discharged in the direction of neighbours. Concerned for the safety and wellbeing of nearby residents but aware that the only way of disarming the man was by a direct frontal approach, Mr Williams undertook the considerable personal risk of an open charge to the gunman. During his unprotected approach Mr Williams had the armed man's rifle pointed at him but was able to reach him before the weapon could be aimed and fired. the ensuing struggle Mr Williams was again under risk from the rifle before successfully disarming the man and bringing to a safe conclusion a situation that posed a serious risk to many people.

By his actions Mr Williams displayed considerable bravery.

Mr Ian Richard ANGEL Corner Stapylton and Quarry Roads STAPYLTON QLD 4207

On the afternoon of 7 August 1991 Mr Angel dived into the channel of an artificial rapids ride at a Gold Coast amusement park to rescue a two-year-old child. Mr Angel, who was operating another entertainment, responded immediately to calls for help from the child's mother and ran through the park to intercept the boy in the channel. Despite the fast moving and turbulent water, and aware of the presence of large underwater induction pipes, Mr Angel plunged three metres into the channel, reached the child at the start of a slatted conveyor belt and lifted him to safety.

For his actions Mr Angel is commended for brave conduct.

Mr Steven Charles CARPENTER 22 Greengate Grove HACKHAM SA 5163

On 27 April 1992 Mr Carpenter went to the assistance of a security guard who was struggling with an armed offender at Noarlunga. Mr Carpenter was leaving his car at a shopping centre when he saw that the guard was bleeding from the head and attempting to subdue a man armed with a screwdriver. Regardless of the danger to himself Mr Carpenter ran towards the disturbance. In spite of being attacked by the armed man's female companions Mr Carpenter, with the aid of the security guard and a bystander, restrained the offender, removed him from a car in which he was attempting to escape and held him until the arrival of the police.

For his actions Mr Carpenter is commended for brave conduct.

Ms Neesha Irene COPLEY 78 Stuart Street INGLEWOOD WA 6052

On the morning of 3 August 1991 Ms Copley attempted to rescue a trapped canoeist from the Avon River at Katrine As a qualified diver and a member of the Western Australian Underwater Explorers' Club, Ms Copley was on rescue duty at Katrine Bridge for the running of the Avon Descent when a competitor's kayak capsized and he was trapped beneath the river surface against a pylon. Although aware of the dangers of the swift flowing turbulent current and snags, Ms Copley alternated with another diver in repeated attempts to free the canoeist, but was swept away from the kayak by the force of the current on each occasion. When the canoe eventually cleared the bridge Ms Copley again entered the river and assisted her fellow diver with the administration of artificial resuscitiation to the canoeist until further help arrived.

For her actions Ms Copley is commended for brave conduct.

Mr Ian James COWAN 28 Camillo Street COOLBELLUP WA 6163

On the morning of 3 August 1991 Mr Cowan attempted to rescue a trapped canoeist from the Avon River at Katrine As a qualified diver and a member of the Western Australian Underwater Explorers' Club, Mr Cowan was on rescue duty at Katrine Bridge for the running of the Avon Descent when a competitor's kayak capsized and he was trapped beneath the river surface against a pylon. Without hesitation Mr Cowan entered the fast flowing and turbulent water with a life line and swam to the submerged canoe, but was swept downstream before he could free the canoeist. Although aware of the considerable danger of the situation and the Although now additional hazard of underwater snags, Mr Cowan alternated with another diver in repeated rescue attempts until the canoe and its occupant were freed. Mr Cowan then accompanied the kayak as it was swept downstream and with the help of his fellow diver administered artificial resuscitation to the canoeist until further help arrived.

For his actions Mr Cowan is commended for brave conduct.

Constable First Class Marguerite Therese EDWARDS New South Wales Police Service

On the afternoon of 23 December 1991 at Emu Plains Constable First Class Edwards participated with other officers of the New South Wales Police Service in the pursuit and apprehension of an armed robber. The offender had left the scene of an armed hold-up and was travelling through an industrial/rural area of Emu Plains when he was forced to abandon his car. Constable Edwards with other officers, although under fire from the offender's automatic rifle maintained a confining pressure that kept him away from populated areas, and caused him to retreat to a position from where he had no escape. By accepting the risk to her own safety Constable Edwards enabled a desperate offender to be apprehended without endangering the general public.

For her actions Constable First Class Edwards is commended for brave conduct.

Senior Constable David Sean EGGETT Western Australia Police Force

On the morning of 8 May 1992 Senior Constable Eggett participated in the removal of an injured passenger from the blazing wreckage of a crashed helicopter at Kelmscott. Constable Eggett was on duty at the Kelmscott Primary School when the helicopter crashed at the adjacent Rushton Park Oval. Although aware of the danger of a rapid spread of fire in the helicopter's engine area, Constable Eggett ran to the crash and helped to free a trapped and injured passenger. Shortly afterwards the helicopter was engulfed in flames.

For his actions Senior Constable Eggett is commended for brave conduct.

Mr Grantley FILMER Filmer Road TINTINARA SA 5266

On the afternoon of 2 April 1992 on a property near Field Mr Filmer placed his own safety in serious jeopardy in attempting to rescue two electrocuted men. Mr Filmer and two other farmers were transferring lupin seeds when the grain auger made contact with a high voltage overhead wire. Seeing his companions struck down by a charge of sufficient severity to set rubber tyres burning, Mr Filmer, without regard for his own safety, went to their assistance, suffering injuries and being rendered unconscious in the attempt. On recovering consciousness, Mr Filmer again entered the danger area and despite his injuries and shock gave first aid to the two electrocuted men until forced to stop by his own condition.

For his actions Mr Filmer is commended for brave conduct.

Mr Ian Patrick FRAPPELL C/- Ardmona Post Office ARDMONA VIC 3629

On the afternoon of 15 December 1991 Mr Frappell rescued an injured woman and her young daughter from a burning car in the Nalinga Hills. The car had earlier gone out of control and collided with Mr Frappell's truck, before coming to rest some distance from the road and catching fire. Without hesitation Mr Frappell ran to the burning car, reached into the cabin to remove the injured child and carried her to safety. He returned and despite the increasing intensity of the fire removed the trapped and immobilised driver. Shortly afterwards the car was completely engulfed in flames.

For his actions Mr Frappell is commended for brave conduct.

Andrew Paul FREAN 108 Kalamunda Road GOOSEBERRY HILL WA 6076

On the afternoon of 24 June 1991 Andrew Frean, then aged 14, placed his own safety at risk to give help to a fellow student in the flooded Helena River at Pexton. Andrew was returning from football practice with other students when he responded to calls from two of his fellows assisting a student who had fallen into the river from a submerged crossing. In July 1991 the ship's company of the oil rig tender "LADY KATHLEEN" displayed high courage which, aided by initiative and exemplary seamanship, enabled them to avert a major pollution disaster by removing a stricken oil tanker to safety. On the morning of 21 July 1991 "LADY KATHLEEN" responded to an emergency call from a burning oil tanker which had lost its bow in heavy seas off the reefs north west of When "LADY KATHLEEN" arrived the tanker was Wedge Island. spilling oil and being driven shorewards. Operating in conditions of extreme hazard and difficulty, with strong winds and heavy seas and in imminent danger of conflagration, "LADY KATHLEEN" closed on the tanker to pick up a useable line streaming from its stern. A towing attempt was frustrated when the line parted. Returning to the danger zone, "LADY KATHLEEN" lay alongside the tanker and succeeded in putting a line party aboard, enabling the connection of a towing rig. Despite the difficult conditions "LADY KATHLEEN" was able to hold the tanker until wind and sea abated sufficiently to enable her to tow the vessel further off shore. Throughout this demanding action, the ship's company of the "LADY KATHLEEN" maintained a calm and purposeful dedication to the operation and performed their dangerous tasks with courage and enterprise.

Crew of the Bristow Search and Rescue Helicopter based at RAAF Base Pearce, Western Australia, in recognition of bravery in exceptional circumstances on 21 July 1991

On the morning of 21 July 1991 Captain Clark, Mr Nelson and Mr Ricercato, the crew of a rescue helicopter, removed to safety 17 survivors of a stricken oil tanker off the Western Australian coast, in hazardous and difficult conditions. In severe turbulence and with visibility inhibited by fog and rain, the crew winched six people from the deck of the crippled vessel and carried them ashore. Returning to the tanker the helicopter crew again experienced considerable difficulty due to the air turbulence and violent movements of the ship in the heavy seas, but persevered to lift another five people to safety. A third flight enabled them to winch the last six members of the tanker's crew aboard and bring them to safety.

Crew members of Western Australia Police Force Air Wing, Jandakot, in recognition of bravery in exceptional circumstances on 21 July 1991

On the morning of 21 July 1991, Special Constable Mayo, Special Constable Rudge, Special Constable Rudrum and Special Constable Whitfield flew 24 sorties in the Police Helicopter Polair, under hazardous and difficult conditions to rescue 24 crew members from a stricken oil tanker off the Western Australian coast. Operating in conditions of extremely low visibility, strong winds and severe turbulence Polair winched individuals from the deck of the tanker and carried them ashore in batches of three and four. During the morning, despite further deterioration in the conditions, Polair's crew made frequent returns to the tanker and although aware of the added dangers from the ship's superstructure in the violent seas, operated from a low level to winch aboard more survivors from the stricken tanker, and remained with the vessel until the evacuation was completed.
