STAR OF COURAGE

Constable James Joseph O'BRIEN, Northern Territory Police Service

On 3 August 1999, Constable O'Brien was involved in a gunfight at a police roadblock on the Stuart Highway, near Adelaide River, Northern Territory, and repeatedly left a position of safety to protect others from injury.

Constable O'Brien and a fellow police officer set up a roadblock on the Stuart Highway to assist in apprehending a gunman who had gone on a shooting rampage After several hours directing traffic, the policemen were the previous evening. approached by two men in a removalist vehicle. As Constable O'Brien explained the reason for the roadblock, one of the drivers was suddenly shot in the back and fell to the ground. The shot was fired by the gunman who was hidden in the nearby bush. Reinforcements were called as Constable O'Brien and his colleague returned fire. The gunman refused to surrender and continued with a volley of accurate and controlled fire from a heavy calibre rifle. Constable O'Brien's colleague was mortally wounded. Constable O'Brien then provided covering fire while the wounded driver was dragged to safety by his companion. Exchanges of gunfire continued with Constable O'Brien repeatedly leaving the safety of cover to return the gunman's fire to protect others and himself from further harm. Police reinforcements eventually arrived but from their position they were unable to detect the location of the gunman. In order to protect the unsuspecting officers, Constable O'Brien again left the cover of safety to attract the gunman's attention. As the gunman was about to open fire, Constable O'Brien shot and killed him.

By his actions Constable O'Brien displayed conspicuous courage.

Mr Ronnie Francis AVERY, deceased,

On the evening of 18 May 1999, Mr Avery lost his life after he attempted to rescue a friend who had fallen into the river from the Clarence River Bridge, Grafton.

Mr Avery witnessed his friend fall and strike his head against a bridge pylon as he fell ten metres into the water. Despite not being a competent swimmer, Mr Avery jumped off the bridge into the water and helped his friend swim to a nearby bridge pylon. Mr Avery's attempts to lift his friend onto the pylon were unsuccessful. He then decided that they should both swim to the riverbank approximately 200 metres away. Mr Avery towed his friend behind him as they both attempted to reach safety. During the swim Mr Avery became exhausted and sank below the surface several times. Mr Avery eventually failed to surface and drowned in his attempt to save his friend.

By his actions Mr Avery displayed considerable bravery thereby losing his life.

To avert an explosion, water was played over the 'hot' cylinder while Mr Bickle and two other men isolated the other cylinders and shut the plant down. Moments later, Mr Bickle and his co-workers received warning that the hot cylinder was beginning to blister and about to explode. Before they could escape, however, the cylinder exploded demolishing the loading bay and causing serious injury to one of the employees. Gas clouds and dust rendered the area extremely volatile. On learning that one of the workers had been injured in the blast and was still in the building, Mr Bickle and two other colleagues attempted to enter the building through the rear door but were driven back by gas fumes. They then used another access to enter the building and found the injured employee in the debris. Mr Bickle helped to evacuate the injured man from the damaged building and arranged medical attention before entering the building once again with the two other colleagues in order to isolate the remaining cylinders and to render the area safe from further explosions.

By his actions, Mr Bickle displayed considerable bravery.

Probationary Constable Matthew Kane CAMPBELL, New South Wales Police Service

On the night of 16 February 1999, Probationary Constable Campbell rescued a girl from an oncoming train at the Mount Druitt Railway Station, New South Wales.

After arriving at the Mount Druitt Railway Station, a mentally ill girl advised staff that she intended to take her own life by placing herself in the path of an oncoming train. Police were summoned and Probationary Constable Campbell, accompanied by a colleague, attended the scene. As they arrived on the platform, the girl stepped off the platform onto the railway ballast adjacent to the track. At this time, a train was approaching at a speed of approximately 155 kilometres per hour. Probationary Constable Campbell saw the lights of the rapidly approaching train and realised that the girl was in grave danger of being hit by the oncoming train. He then climbed down onto the tracks and ran towards the girl. As he ran he heard the horn of the train sounding and saw the girl step into the path of the oncoming train. Without regard for his personal safety, he lunged at the girl and tackled her onto the railway ballast as the train passed them. The girl continued to struggle with Probationary Constable Campbell as the train carriages passed only a metre from them, but he was able to restrain her until the train had passed.

The front portion of the vehicle immediately burst into flames, which were quickly fuelled by escaping gas from the ruptured main. Mr Churnin immediately drove towards the burning car, stopped and ran to the driver's side where he saw the driver slumped forward over the steering wheel, apparently unconscious. Mr Churnin tried to open the door on the driver's side but it was locked. He then ran around to the passenger side and was able to gain entry into the vehicle. The driver was unconscious and remained strapped by her seat belt. By this time the fire had generated intense heat in the vehicle and the front part of the vehicle was ablaze. Mr Churnin unfastened the seat belt and tried to drag the unconscious driver clear. His first attempt failed. On his second attempt, Mr Churnin was able to free the driver and drag her out of the vehicle to safety. A few minutes later the vehicle was totally incinerated.

Mr Cooper embarked on the rescue mission with the full knowledge that the seas were dangerous. After sailing throughout the night in severe weather conditions, the Emmanuel III was located the next morning and a towline was secured to it so that it could be towed to safety. operation, the towline snapped several times which required Mr Cooper and a colleague to run out onto the heaving deck to re-attach the towline. midnight on 16 July, the decision was taken to cut the towline as the Emmanuel III was beginning to take in water. It soon sank and its three crewmen left floundering in heavy seas. Mr Cooper positioned himself at the bow of the vessel and, with large waves crashing over him, trained a spotlight on the stricken crewmen so that the skipper of the Southern Image could manoeuvre the vessel to pass close by them. During the pass, Mr Cooper positioned himself on the 'marlin board' at the rear of the vessel and, with the help of his colleague, pulled all the stricken crewmen onto the rescue vessel.

Police reinforcements were called as the policemen returned fire. The gunman refused to surrender, mortally wounding one of the policemen. Throughout, Mr Hobden's colleague remained exposed in the line of fire and was in danger of being shot at again by the gunman. Realising this, and without regard for his personal safety, Mr Hobden ran out from behind the cover of the police car to where his wounded friend lay exposed and dragged him to safety.

Federal Agent Paul Alexander McEWAN, Australian Federal Police

On the afternoon of 11 August 1999 in Viqueque, East Timor, Federal Agent McEwan was serving with the United Nations Assistance Mission in East Timor (UNAMET) when he participated in the rescue of an Indonesian police officer who was being attacked by pro-independence East Timorese villagers.

While on patrol, Federal Agent McEwan and a fellow UNAMET officer encountered a group of East Timorese villagers retrieving the body of a man who had been killed by pro-Indonesian militias. Federal Agent McEwan and his companion were at the scene when the Indonesian police officer arrived. The arrival of the officer provoked the angry villagers who menaced him with their machetes and spears. Federal Agent McEwan and his companion placed themselves between the officer and the hostile crowd and prevented the crowd from pressing their attack. Some of the villagers who tried to strike the officer were wrestled away by Federal Agent McEwan and his companion. Fearing for his life, the officer broke away and ran into nearby bushes. He was pursued by some of the villagers who attacked him with their machetes. Federal Agent McEwan blocked the path of the hostile crowd while his companion followed the officer to prevent him from being killed. The injured officer was later carried to safety.

After approximately fifteen minutes of swimming and treading water, they were picked up by a rescue boat and delivered safely to shore.

On the morning of 8 April 1999, Mr Poulter received serious injuries in an explosion at a gas plant in Rocklea, Queensland, after warning his fellow workers.

Mr Poulter was a member of a team filling acetylene gas cylinders when one of the cylinders began to overheat. Mr Poulter immediately warned his work colleagues of the presence of the 'hot' cylinder and played water over the cylinder while his colleagues moved to isolate the other cylinders and to shut the plant down. Without regard for his personal safety, Mr Poulter remained at his post, hosing the hot cylinder down with water. Moments later, Mr Poulter called out that the cylinder was beginning to blister and warned that it was about to explode. Before he and his colleagues could escape, however, the cylinder exploded demolishing the loading bay and amputating Mr Poulter's left leg above the knee. Gas clouds and dust rendered the area extremely volatile. On learning of Mr Poulter's plight the colleagues assessed the danger and carried him out of the damaged building and arranged medical attention before re-entering the building again in order to isolate the remaining cylinders and to render the area safe from further explosions.

By his actions, Mr Poulter displayed considerable bravery.

On the afternoon of 26 April 1999, Mr Rich rescued a young boy from drowning after the boy was caught in a rip at Main Beach, Kiama, New South Wales.

Mr Rich was at the northern end of Main Beach when he saw a woman and two young boys in distress in the water. Realising that the three were in danger of being sucked out to sea by the rip, Mr Rich ran down to the rocks to assist the distressed swimmers. On reaching the water's edge Mr Rich, without regard for his personal safety, jumped into the sea and swam over to one of the two boys. He grabbed hold of the boy as they were submerged by a large wave. On resurfacing, Mr Rich saw the unconscious woman float by and grabbed hold of her as well, but the pounding waves caused him to loose hold of her as she disappeared under the surf. Mr Rich held the boy by his arms and swam with him out to sea so as to avoid the danger of the large waves breaking onto the rocks. Mr Rich clung onto the boy as they were being swept out to sea by the strong rip. After approximately fifteen minutes of swimming and treading water, they were picked up by a rescue boat and delivered safely to shore.

Senior Constable Richard Alan ROSTRON, New South Wales Police Service

On the afternoon of 20 January 1999, Senior Constable Rostron assisted in the capture of an armed offender after a bank robbery in Bowral, New South Wales.

Senior Constable Rostron was off duty when he noticed a man emerge from a bank building and pull off a mask before running off down the street. A bank employee followed the man out from the building and reported to Senior Constable Rostron that a masked man had just robbed the bank. The bank employee then pointed out the bank robber to Senior Constable Rostron who pursued the robber on foot. During the pursuit the bank robber realised that Senior Constable Rostron was following him. He turned and threatened to shoot him with a pistol and followed up his threat by firing a shot at Senior Constable Rostron. Despite this and without regard for his personal safety, Senior Constable Rostron continued the pursuit. The robber turned and fired a second time. Undeterred, Senior Constable Rostron continued to pursue the robber who fired a third shot at him before disappearing into a nearby street. Using a mobile phone, Senior Constable Rostron was able to inform the police of the robber's escape route; information that ultimately led to the apprehension of the offender.

By his actions, Senior Constable Rostron displayed considerable bravery.

On the morning of 9 February 1999, Mr Ryan attempted to rescue a child who had been washed down a stormwater inlet during flooding at Orange Park, Palmwoods, Queensland.

They informed Mr Ryan that a child had disappeared into the stormwater inlet and that the child may be trapped in the manhole pit. Mr Ryan entered the water and with his hands probed the muddy water in an attempt to locate the missing child. He was able to locate the child's body but was unable to dislodge it because of the force of the water. He then asked people at the scene to hold onto his legs and, without fear for his personal safety, entered head first into the flooded access hole to retrieve the child. He failed in his first two attempts, swallowing large amounts of water during each attempt. On the third attempt, he was able to pull the child from the flooded manhole pit and he immediately attempted to resuscitate the child. With the help of others at the scene, resuscitation was continued until the arrival of an ambulance and paramedical team.

The assailant then attacked Mr Sadowsky, lunging at him several times in an attempt to stab him. Without fear for his personal safety, Mr Sadowsky remained in the room and with a mop handle struck the assailant several times to dislodge the knife and causing the assailant to fall onto the floor. Mr Sadowsky then tried to check the condition of the woman but the assailant got up from the floor and attacked him again. A struggle between the two men ensued before others arrived and helped Mr Sadowsky to restrain the assailant.

On the afternoon of11 August 1999 in Viqueque, East Timor, Major John Sholl was serving with the United Nations Assistance Mission in East Timor (UNAMET) when he participated in the rescue of an Indonesian police officer who was being attacked by pro-independence East Timorese villagers.

While on patrol, Major Sholl and a fellow UNAMET officer encountered a group of East Timorese villagers retrieving the body of a man who had been killed by pro-Indonesian militias. Major Sholl and his companion were at the scene when the Indonesian police officer arrived. The arrival of the officer provoked the angry villagers who menaced him with their machetes and spears. Major Sholl and his companion placed themselves between the officer and the hostile crowd and prevented them from pressing their attack. Some of the villagers who tried to strike the officer were wrestled away by Major Sholl and his companion. Fearing for his life, the officer broke away and ran into nearby bushes. He was pursued by some of the villagers who attacked him with their machetes. Major Sholl followed and placed himself between the officer and his attackers so as to prevent the officer from being killed. Moments later Major Sholl was able to lift the injured officer to his feet and carry him to safety.

On 28 December 1998, Mr Thirsk was taken hostage by a group of Yemeni terrorists and subsequently lost his life as he attempted to protect other members of the group.

Mr Thirsk was a member of a tourist group in Yemen taken hostage by terrorists. The hostages were driven into a remote desert area, divided into two groups, and held there under heavily-armed guard. Despite interrogation by terrorist leaders and involvement in threatening and intimidating exchanges with the bandits, Mr Thirsk did not avoid taking the role of group spokesman. As Yemeni Government forces closed in on the hostage-takers, the tourists were made to stand on top of a small mound with their hands in the air facing the approaching forces, serving as human shields for the terrorists. Without regard for his personal safety, Mr Thirsk deliberately placed himself at the front of the group in a position where he would probably be the first to be hit in any exchange of fire. A fierce gun battle soon erupted between the Government forces and the terrorists. During the battle, Mr Thirsk was shot in the abdomen and fell to the ground. As he lay wounded, he received another gunshot wound in the stomach. In the ensuing firefight, Mr Thirsk and a female British tourist who had gone to his aid were killed by gunshots to the head and abdomen.

By his actions, Mr Thirsk displayed considerable bravery thereby losing his life.

The two men who had joined Mr Villanueva in the pursuit went to his assistance and together they wrestled the offender to the ground where they were able to disarm him and restrain him until police arrived.

On 28 December 1998, Mrs Whitehouse was taken hostage by a group of Yemeni terrorists and subsequently lost her life as she attempted to protect an Australian member of the group who had been wounded by gunfire.

Mrs Whitehouse was a member of a tourist group in Yemen taken hostage by terrorists. As Yemeni Government forces closed in on the terrorists, Mrs Whitehouse and three other hostages, including an Australian man, were made to stand on top of a small mound with their hands in the air facing the approaching forces, serving as human shields for the terrorists. A gun battle soon erupted between the Government forces and the terrorists. During the battle, the Australian man was shot in the abdomen and fell to the ground. Mrs Whitehouse, without regard for her personal safety, ran to his aid and used a handkerchief to try and stem the bleeding. As he lay wounded, the man received another gunshot wound in the stomach. Mrs Whitehouse was wounded in the ankle but continued administering aid and comfort to the man. In the ensuing firefight, both Mrs Whitehouse and the Australian were killed by gunshots to the head and abdomen.

By her actions, Mrs Whitehouse displayed considerable bravery thereby losing her life.

On 20 November 1997, Constable Wilson was in the Five Dock area of Sydney when he attempted to apprehend an offender who had snatched a bag from a woman.

On investigating a report, Constable Wilson saw the offender fighting with other men and, with the assistance of another police officer, was able to handcuff the offender's hands to his front. As Constable Wilson was reporting the incident, the offender got to his feet and knocked him to the ground before running off to a nearby car park where the offender had left his vehicle with its engine running. Constable Wilson pursued the offender who managed to get into the car. Through the open car door Constable Wilson tried to pull the offender out of the vehicle; however, the offender was able to drive off, accelerating harshly in an attempt to loosen Constable Wilson's grip as he clung onto him. Constable Wilson was dragged a short distance before his right foot got caught under the rear wheel of the car, causing him to let go of the offender. The car passed over Constable Wilson as it sped off. Despite his injuries, Constable Wilson was able to get to his feet and pursue the car for a short distance before collapsing from his injuries.

On 18 August 1999, Mr Winkworth rescued a man from a crocodile attack at MacArthur Island, Cape York, Queensland.

Mr Winkworth and two of his companions were resting on MacArthur Island after a canoeing trip when he joined one of his companions for a swim in the shallow water. They were paddling about in thigh-deep water when Mr Winkworth's companion suddenly cried out. Mr Winkworth turned and saw that the water around his companion was agitated and that the sand was being churned up in the water. Not knowing what was happening, Mr Winkworth waded towards him and saw the outline of a four metre crocodile in the water. The crocodile had its teeth firmly embedded in his companion's right leg and was trying to sweep him off his feet in a death roll. Without regard for his personal safety, Mr Winkworth jumped on the crocodile, straddling it with his feet and wrapping his arms around its torso. Mr Winkworth clung on to the crocodile in this manner as the crocodile continued to thrash about in the water. Mr Winkworth's action caused the crocodile to release its hold on his companion and, having flicked Mr Winkworth off its back, the crocodile escaped into deeper water.

Mr Chandler swam back to the beach and even though he was exhausted he assisted in giving first aid to the patient.

However, with additional rope obtained from the police vessel, he was able to throw one end of the rope to the stranded passengers who, in turn, were able to pull the dinghy in close enough for one of the passengers to jump from the rock into it. Using another rope secured to the police vessel, Detective Senior Constable Towie pulled the dinghy to the vessel and transferred the passenger on board. Without fear for his personal safety, he returned to the rock five more times and by using the same process removed the remaining stranded passengers to safety.
