Professor Hills, a specialist in respiratory physiology, undertook research into surface active phospholipids (or surfactants) and the passage of air bubbles through the pulmonary circulation system.

Professor Hills also conducted research into decompression sickness amongst divers and pioneered the introduction of deep sea stops and a dual phase model of decompression. This research replaced the traditionally accepted Haldane concept. During the 1960s he recorded the empirically derived decompression schedules of divers and developed a mathematical model to calculate decompression tables.

Further, Professor Hills' research has been used to develop preventative agents for asthma, and has led to investigations into the lubrication of bone joints and into peptic ulcer disease.
