The Centre receives no support from the Mongolian government; funding comes from national and international companies and institutions, as well as child sponsorships; all funds raised are directed to the improvement of child health and educational growth.

Didi Kalika has been involved in community-based activities since the early 1980s; after training in Sweden and India she became an Ananda Marga Nun, 1990; subsequently posted to Tokyo and then Mongolia as a yoga teacher.
